Louisa enjoyed keeping an immaculate home and caring for her family. She was a stay-at-home mom while raising her daughter; she then worked in housekeeping and customer service jobs until her grandchildren Natalie and Nathaniel were born. They changed her world. She would always be there if you needed her. She was an amazing and proud grandmother. She helped tremendously in their upbringing and provided support throughout their lives.

Louisa's family would describe her as being loving, caring, encouraging, family oriented, direct, and a joker. She liked to lighten things up and to keep others laughing. Her French vocabulary often had her English language a little backward, resulting in funny things she would say. Although she didn't finish High School, she was the dean of the house. She followed a strict regimen when it came to taking care of herself, painting her nails and giving herself a facial once a week, putting rollers in her hair every night. It was difficult for her to dress herself the last few months of her life because of her health but she made it a point to get dressed everyday before dinner. She always took great pride in her dress and appearance. She will always be remembered for her beautiful smile, her generous heart, for expressing how she felt and "saying it like it is".
